## How to Set up a Democratic Republic of the Congo Subsidiary

Learning how to set up a Democratic Republic of the Congo subsidiary can take up a significant amount of your time. You have to consider several factors that could impact the incorporation process, such as your entity and location in the country. Some countries operate like the US, with different cities, regions, or states having various Democratic Republic of the Congo subsidiary laws. Finding the right location can mean friendlier incorporation laws for foreign countries.

Next, we recommend discussing the type of entity that works best for your needs. The Democratic Republic of the Congo will allow you to incorporate as one of several types of subsidiaries, such as a limited liability company (LLC), simplified joint stock company, public limited company, free zone company, branch office, or representative office. Since most companies incorporate as an LLC, the Democratic Republic of the Congo subsidiary setup process includes:

- Sending a letter of request for incorporation to the general manager of the One-Stop-Shop
- Drafting and notarizing the articles of association with the public notary
- Obtaining copies of the criminal record for the company's manager
- Registering articles of association with the commercial registrar at the Clerk's Office of the Court
- Submitting necessary documents such as identification of managers, criminal record of managers, and copy of a lease

- Opening an in-country bank account
- Registering with the tax authorities
- Publishing the notice of your company's formation in a legal journal
- Notifying the Ministry of Labor about the start of operations
- Registering with the Social Security Authorities

## Democratic Republic of the Congo Subsidiary Laws

You need to follow the Democratic Republic of the Congo subsidiary laws related to your entity. LLCs have their own set of laws that you'll need to follow to stay compliant. For example, you need one shareholder, a minimum of \$1 paid-up capital, and at least one director who does not need to be a resident in the country.

Before you register your company, you'll need to establish a local bank account and deposit your share capital. Then, you're required to register for tax and social security. Every year your company operates in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, you'll need to submit annual financial statements and a tax return.
